My Lord

The undersigned

with the questionable proficency
of intruding upon your Lordship's
views in relation to the object
of their application, would
respectfully but earnestly
request the appointment
of George Coppell Esq, now
acting Consul at New Orleans.
as Consul in this Post, left
vacant

vacant by the death of
W^m M^r Eg^t.

The undersigned have been induced to address your Lordship in his behalf in consideration of the very extraordinary services which have been forced upon him by the unhappy struggle which for the last two years and a half has existed in the United States: and of the self-sacrifice, kindness, and ability with which he has honestly discharged the arduous duties of his office without giving offence to those who were in power.—

The undersigned who are, it must be admitted, competent judges of facts and events

events in which they have participated are satisfied that it would be difficult to find one who could have protected the interests confided to his care through this storm with greater success; and that his conduct, whilst it secured the respect of those in authority, has or should have, satisfied all who sought for Consular assistance.

With reference to his official capacity the undersigned can of course suggest nothing—

Your Lordship's & Her Majestys Minister at Washington being far more fitting judges than themselves but they would remark, that the appointment, if made would be in their opinion but a slender compensation

compensate for the anxiety
and amount of personal
labor which the Office, through
the period they have referred
to, has exacted from Mr. Gifford.

The experience of nearly
four years in this Consulate, and,
since September 4th 1861, as Her
Majesty's Acting Consul, has, I trust,
not

not been lost upon me. I have
had the honour to receive Your
Lordships' approval of my pro-
ceedings; and - of necessity - having
more communication with Her
Majesty's Minister at Washington
than with Your Lordship (and to
whom at all times I have fully
reported my actions) His Lordship
has frequently - if not in all
cases - accorded his approbation.

On these grounds alone
do I present myself to Your
Lordship as an applicant for
the position, and, should -
